The Power of Prayer

Mark 9:14-29

- I. <u>Scene One</u> Spiritual Power <u>Missing</u> The disciples could not cast the demon out of a boy at this time in God's plan (Mark 9:14-19).
 - A. <u>Argument:</u> The scribes discredit Jesus for the disciples' failure to deliver the boy (14-15).
 - B. <u>Desperation</u>: The father explains to Jesus that the disciples could not help his demonpossessed boy (16-18).
 - C. <u>Rebuke</u>: Jesus expresses his dismay at the crowds' lack of faith (19; "perverse generation" Matthew 17:17).
 - Faith Note: Sometimes God's power is sovereignly inactive because of His purpose in a particular situation. (Antagonistic attitude here by scribes?)
- II. <u>Scene Two</u>: Spiritual power is <u>Present</u> The father has new, growing faith and Jesus delivers the boy from demon possession (Mark 9:20-27).
 - A. <u>Brought to Jesus</u>: The convulsing boy with the evil spirit is brought to Jesus (20-22a).
 - B. <u>Plea for help</u>: The father begs Jesus to help (22b-24).
 - Faith Note: We must ask (22; "in his name" John 16:24)!
 - Faith Note: Anything is possible when we trust God (23).
 - Faith Note: God delights in new, growing faith (24a).
 - Faith Note: We need God's help to trust God more (24b).
 - C. Deliverance: Jesus casts out the demon (25-27).
- III. <u>Scene Three</u>: Spiritual power <u>depends on prayer</u> Jesus instructs the disciples about their failure to pray in faith (Mark 9:28-29).
 - A. Disciples want to know why they failed (28).
 - B. Jesus wants them to know why they failed (29).
 - Faith Note: Power requires Prayer: We often don't have God's power at work in our lives because we fail to pray.
 - Faith Note: Power requires Faith: It's not how much faith, but in whom we are putting our faith (Matthew 17:20-21).

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
