God's Grace In Times of Sin

Judges 2:14-3:11

- I. <u>God's grace when discipline was required</u>: The cycle of sin, discipline and God's grace (Judges 2:14-23)
 - A. <u>God grace in spite of sin</u>: God punished Israel by allowing nearby nations to defeat them, but in His <u>grace</u> God raised up judges to deliver Israel (2:14-19).
 - The cycle of the judges Sin, Slavery, Cry out to God, God raises up a judge to deliver Israel
 - A. Sin always has consequences.
 - God delivered Israel when they were in distress.
 - A. God cares about our misery even when we deserve it.
 - God's deliverance never had a lasting internal effect.
 - A. The intent of God's grace is to be glorified for His grace.
 - B. <u>God's gracious purposes even in discipline</u>: God no longer allowed Israel to totally defeat their enemies, but God used their enemies for His purposes (2:20-3:6).
 - God used the Canaanites to test Israel (2:22; 3:4).
 - A. The presence of temptation is not an excuse, but a test.
 - God used the Canaanites give Israel warfare experience (3:2).
 - A. God can use our parent's failures positively in us.
 - Israel failed the test and intermarried with the Canaanites and served their gods (3:6).
 - A. Those who surround us, influence us.
- II. <u>God's grace expressed through Othniel</u> Israel's first judge (Judges 3:7-11)
 - A. God disciplined Israel through Cushan-Rishathaim (3:7-8).
 - B. God delivered Israel through Othniel (3:9-11).

Othniel

- ➤ He didn't hesitate because of his age at least 75 when he won this battle (Joshua 17:7, 10, 29, 30)!
- ➤ He was godly indwelt by the Holy Spirit (3:9,10).
- ➤ He was a proven, courageous leader (Judges 1:11-13).

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
