SERMON OUTLINE

Imitate Good not Evil 3 John 9-14

I. <u>Diotrephes, the Controller</u>: John exposes the arrogance of Diotrephes (3 John 9-11).

- A. John had written to Gaius' church before, but Diotrephes had suppressed the letter (9)
 - 1. He wants to be "in charge."
 - 2. He doesn't want to let outside speakers in.
- B. When John comes he will bring up to the whole church what Diotrephes is doing (10).
 - 1. He is spreading gossip about John.
 - 2. He doesn't let other Bible teachers in.
 - 3. He expels those who want to host outside teachers.

Overcoming our "Need" to Control

- 1. **Relax** Recognize the security of our relationship with Christ. There is nothing to prove. We are unconditionally loved. God will use us significantly, but on His terms.
- 2. <u>Submit</u> Submit to God and to people. We don't always know best. Willingly make yourself accountable to other people and groups. Bounce things off of others! Don't be a lone ranger!
- 3. <u>Let go and Share (Delegation/Teamwork)</u> God put others in the body of Christ for a reason. They have different perspectives and gifts. God wants to use them to complete what we lack.
 - C. John urges Gaius to imitate the good examples he knows, not the bad (11).
 - 1. Imitate good examples, not evil.
 - 2. Someone who does evil is acting out of their sinful flesh and has lost sight of who God is.

II. <u>Demetrius, the Godly Teacher:</u> John affirms the good example of Demetrius (3 John 12-14)

- A. Demetrius has a proven reputation in his life and doctrine.
- B. John also approves of Demetrius by personal experience.
- C. Conclusion: John anticipates a personal visit (13-14).
