The Unpardonable Sin and the Grace of God

Mark 3:22-30

- I. <u>Christ's Power</u> and the unique *Unpardonable Sin* of the Scribes and Pharisees (Mark 3:22-29)
 - A. Context: Christ cast out demons (3:22; Matthew 12:22-23)
 - B. The Hate of the Scribes and Pharisees (3:22)
 - Their logic: a) Jesus is doing amazing things b) Satan has amazing power. C) Therefore, Jesus must be doing amazing things by the power of Satan.
 - Lies repeated long enough are accepted as fact.
 - C. The Truth about Satan (3:23-27)
 - 1. It is illogical that Satan would cast his own demons out.
 - ➢ <u>Illustrations</u>: Divided homes and kingdoms don't last. (So Satan wouldn't fight himself by empowering Jesus.)
 - 2. Therefore, Satan did not empower Jesus' miracles.
 - Proud unbelief will drive people to delusional logic about God's power and the truth about Christ.
 - ➤ <u>Illustration</u>: Like a robber guarding his plunder, Satan is a "strong man" whom Jesus overcomes by delivering his victims (Mark 3:27).
 - > Jesus Christ is at work overcoming Satan spiritually throughout the world
 - D. The Hardness of Human Hearts (3:29).
 - 1. The "unpardonable sin" was these men "blasphemed the Holy Spirit" by ascribing to Satan the miracles of Jesus.
 - 2. The "unpardonable sin" was unique to these Jewish leaders who rejected Christ as Messiah and is not committed today.
 - Although there is not an "unpardonable sin" some people will always reject Jesus Christ.
- II. God's Grace and the assurance that every sin we commit can indeed be forgiven (Mark 3:28)
 - A. God's Grace is complete through the cross of Jesus Christ (Colossians 2:13-14; Romans 8:1; John 5:24).
 - B. God is eager to forgive (2 Peter 3:9; 1 John 1:8, 9).

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
