Samson: Finally Broken

Judges 15:9-16:31

I. <u>Samson's frustration</u>: Samson was victorious, but had no peace with God (Judges 15:9-20)

- Note: Brooding after "foxes" victory/slaughter (15:8)
- A. <u>"The Jawbone"</u> Samson defeats the Philistines (15:9-17)
- B. Angry at God about thirst after victory (15:18-20)
- II. <u>Samson's lust</u>: Samson was immoral, but impressively escaped (Judges 16:1-4).
 - A. Going to a prostitute (16:1-2)
 - B. <u>"The Gate"</u> Samson humiliates the Philistines (16:3-4)

III. <u>Samson's foolishness</u>: Samson was still immoral and foolish, so God disciplined him (Judges 16:5-22).

- A. Living immorally with Delilah (16:4-5)
- B. Foolishly violating his vow to God (16:6-19)
- C. Losing his strength and freedom (16:20-22)
 - Sin deceives and destroys us (Hebrews 3:13; Proverbs 6:32). Pray diligently (1 Peter 5:8-9; Ephesians 6:18).

IV. <u>Samson is finally broken</u>: Samson has a great victory as he dies (Judges 16:23-31).

- A. Samson is captured and the Philistines gloat (16:23-25a)
- B. <u>"Bringing down the house"</u> Samson cries out to God for help and destroys more Philistines than ever as he dies in captivity (16:25b-31)
 - > God is gracious to us if we humble ourselves in brokenness (James 4:6-10).

<u>Principle</u>: God may use us in disobedience, but will discipline us if we are proud and independent.
